SKILLS FOR A DIGITAL WORLD

The Challenge: Better skills, better jobs, better lives

Skills are the new currency. Skills are central to the capacity of countries and people to thrive in an increasingly interconnected and rapidly changing world. Digitalisation, globalisation, climate and demographic change are reshaping work and social environments as well as generating a growing demand for higher levels of non-routine, cognitive skills and new types of skills.

This tidal wave has generated fears about the capacity of populations to adapt rapidly and about the risk that some groups will be left behind. These threats can only be turned into opportunities for well-being and good social outcomes for all if countries adopt an inclusive and life course approach to skills development. People have to be able to re-skill and up-skill throughout their lives, so that they can adjust to the rapid changes, as well as seize new opportunities, in the workplace and in their everyday life.

Making sure that the digital transformation leads to better jobs and better lives will depend on a range of policies, with skills policies being paramount. Skills systems need to be redesigned, so that they equip people with the mix of skills they need throughout their lives, as digitalisation transforms the way people work, communicate, and interact with each other and changes the nature of economies. Governments need to understand the nature of these changes, and how to implement the right policies to ensure that digitalisation promotes sustainable and inclusive growth, and empowers people with the capacity to prosper in a rapidly evolving environment.

Objective

The Skills Summit 2018 will convene ministers with responsibility for a range of skills-relevant portfolios, including education, higher education, vocational education and training, employment, science and innovation, economic development and the digital agenda. The Summit will foster open discussion about what countries are doing to ensure that their citizens have the skills they need to participate fully and effectively in a digital world and what governments are doing to redesign their polices and institutions to be more responsive to the challenges and opportunities of a digital world.

Ministers will have an opportunity to share with each other what they are doing now, and what more they plan to do into the future, to work together across their different portfolios to ensure that people have the skills to succeed in a digital world.

Participation

The Prime Minister of Portugal, the Minister of Education of Portugal and the OECD Secretary-General are extending an invitation to ministers from OECD Member countries as well as to OECD accession and key partner countries.

Format

Each session will start with OECD scene-setting presentations to provide key information data about skills and digitalisation. Plenary discussions will then take place among ministers, moderated by Gavin Dykes. Chatham House rules will be in effect to ensure open and frank communication. The main highlights of the discussions will be published in the form of a Chair's Summary.
