U.S. Environmental Justice Approaches


- Incorporate EJ into EPA regulatory, permitting, and enforcement activities
- Elevate EJ by creating national office
- Previous OECD engagement
- Intergovernmental coordination and increasing federal-US State cooperation

U.S. Justice 40 Initiative

- Goal: U.S. Federal Government has made it a goal that 40 percent of the overall benefits of certain Federal investments flow to disadvantaged communities that are marginalized, underserved, and overburdened by pollution.
- **Progress:** Identified government programs that qualify
- Challenges: Scaling up and reporting
- Lessons Learned: Ensuring community input; dedicating available resources and the importance of data accessibility


Dublic engagement

Things to know:

The tool uses census tracts

Census tracts are a small
unit of geography. They
generally have populations

of between 1,200 - 8,000
people.

Communities that are disadvantaged live in tracts that experience burdens.

These tracts are highlighted on the map.

The tool ranks most of the burdens using percentiles △. Percentiles show how much burden each tract experiences when compared to other tracts.

U.S. EPA's Thriving Communities Technical Assistance Centers

- Goal: The EJTCTAC Program is a program that works towards a holistic government-wide framework for providing technical assistance and capacity building resources to those most in need to improve and foster thriving communities throughout the country.
- **Progress:** EPA selected 16 EJTCTACs that will receive significant resources to help underserved and overburdened communities
- Challenges: Developing a novel approach to establishing a support network
- Lessons Learned: Raising awareness of resources, value of directing information

U.S. EJ Federal Advisory Committees

National Environmental Justice Advisory Committee (NEJAC)

- Goal: The NEJAC provides independent advice and recommendations to the EPA Administrator.
- **Progress:** Historic Credibility, Federal Advisory Committee Act adherence
- Challenges: Increasing participation of regulated industries
- Lessons Learned: Meeting flexibility, subcommittees, long-term membership

White House Environmental Justice Advisory Committee (WHEJAC)

- Goal: The WHEJAC provides independent advice and recommendations to the Chair of the Council on Environmental Quality and to the White House Interagency Council on Environmental Justice
- **Progress:** Executive Order Implementation
- Challenges: Rapid Scaling, Spreading a Common Vision, Tool Development
- Lessons Learned: Advance a unified and clear direction with flexibility to solicit charges that are relevant
